Maths

English

In English we have been looking at turning a story into a play. Each student planned and carried out a short story. We also looked at describing different settings and how to describe a character to give the reader a clear image.

Science

In science we have been looking at energy and how it is transferred. Lots of different engaging activities were done during this and different types of energy were identified.

PSHE

In PSHE we have been looking at how to ask for permission and it is important to ask for permission for different reasons. We have also been looking at relationships and the difference between healthy and unhealthy relationships.

Global Studies

In Global Studies we have been looking at coasts. We have been looking for erosion and how it affects seaside towns and what the impacts are on different people.

Term Five has flown by in Rye Class...

In English our focus has been dystopian fiction. This included an analysis of the terms 'utopia' and 'dystopia', developing our understanding of dystopian conventions and the close reading of extracts from the works of George Orwell and Ray Bradbury to make comparisons between the society they warned us about and how we live today.

In Global Studies, Rye Class have been exploring the Qing Dynasty; its creation, expansion and downfall. This included individual research into topics such as the role of women in the Qing Dynasty, astronomical discoveries and Qing cartoons!

In Mathematics, we have been studying equivalent fractions, concentrating on our times tables and looking at angles in compound 2D shapes - calculating the missing angle from known information.

In Science our studies have focused on human impact and biodiversity including a walk through the Stour Valley to study its biodiversity and examine the impact of pollution.

In Art, Rye class have been exploring Pop Art and the work of Claes Oldenburg. Students have been creating oversized 3D drink or food items. Manipulating card and paper to make the structure, strengthening with papier mâché and finishing with realistic paint colours or logo.

In ICT, we have been coding using a combination of Scratch and Python. The students have created dancing avatars and mini platform games.

One of the tasks Rye Class was set as part of their ASDAN this term was to interview a local creative professional and we were very fortunate to have our own talented TA, Charlotte Fullbrook, to agree to play for us and answer student's questions about her life in music, hopes and inspirations.

This term our DofE participants have been busy completing their skills sections and most students have now completed their volunteering and physical sections.


The skills section has seen a wide range of talent and ability developed by our students.

SANDICLASS

Although this has been a shorter term, we have made the most of it and packed in lots of exciting activities and learning! We kicked things off with a fantastic celebration for World Circus Day. Everyone got involved, learning new circus skills, playing fun games around the school, and of course, enjoying some yummy popcorn!

Last week, we took part in World Mental Health Week, focusing on wellbeing and relaxation. Students enjoyed a range of calming activities including making positivity jars, trying out face masks, and giving each other hand massages. We ended the week with Wear It Green Day, where everyone gathered in the playground to enjoy an ice cream or lolly, blow bubbles, and take part in a wonderful music session led by our amazing music teacher, CJ.

English

In English, we began exploring Black American history in literature through the novel The Hate U Give by Angie Thomas. We will continue this after the break by exploring the Novel 'Roll of Thunder, hear my cry' by Maddie. D. Taylor.

Mathematics

We've been learning about different types of sequences and how to find patterns and rules. We've also started looking at fractions and how to compare and find equivalents.

Global Studies

We started learning about the Industrial Revolution and how it changed the world. We'll continue this next term.

Science

This term we've been learning about waves – including sound, water, and light waves, including some fun and practical activities.

PSHE

Our focus has been on identity and relationships, including topics like gender identity, consent, and an introduction to contraception. This topic has brought up some interesting and insightful debates and conversations, which all pupils have engaged well in.

Some of our pupils have also been taking part in individual sessions, including sensory circuits and working with the Reading Doctor to support their learning and wellbeing. These valuable sessions will continue next term. We are already looking forward to the final term, which promises some exciting opportunities – including fishing and skateboard building!







Sting

Science

In ELC science we have been delving into Chemistry. We visited a quarry to look at what the impacts are of mining for ores. We continued to investigate properties of metals and alloys.

In GCSE Biology, we have begun to study homeostasis and response including hormonal coordination in humans and the nervous system after completing bioenergetics, which involved investigating fermentation. In GCSE Chemistry, we have looked at different types of bonding including ionic, covalent and metallic.

Maths

In Maths this term we have been calculating percentage increase and decrease, as well as calculating area and perimeter. We have more recently been looking at symmetry in 2D shapes, as well as calculating volume of cubes and cuboids.

Students following the GCSE pathway have been learning how to solve simultaneous equations, reverse percentages, standard form, how to calculate speed and density and compound measures, as well as transformation of graphs and velocity graphs.

English

In English students have been studying dystopian fiction. Reading works from authors such as George Orwell and Ray Bradbury, students have considered how close we are to living in the type of totalitarian society writers warned us about.

Art

Many successes in Art this term including the completion of the Bronze Arts Award for two of our students, this is an amazing achievement! Now onto the Silver Arts Award! In GCSE Art students are now beginning their final outcomes for the first unit.

Duke of Edinburgh

Duke of Edinburgh expedition training is in full swing for Hastings class. We have chosen visited go outdoor and been guided to the correct boots and sleeping bags. We have been out practicing our map work and out cooking alongside some First Aid training.


PSHE

ART

Art has consisted of GCSE art examinations and developing coursework during A Level lessons. We continue to build our resources and have invested in a number of new resources including an etching press, sewing machines and a heat press. The sixth form students have utilised these straight away!

ASDAN

Students learnt some basic First Aid skills and how to contact their utility suppliers in the event of an emergency.

SCIENCE

GCSE students have mainly been undertaking exam revision, whilst A Level students have studied Spirometry, measuring the rates of ventilation and dissection.

UNIFORMED PROTECTIVE SERVICES

Students have been preparing for their exam and starting to plan for their upcoming expedition.

MATHS

We have been revising for those taking GCSE Examination aa well as teaching other students how to solve simultaneous equations, reverse percentages, standard form, how to calculate speed and density and compound measures as well as transformation of graphs and velocity graphs. The pace has been quite relentless, but the students have risen to the challenge and must be extremely proud of their achievements in such a s short term.

ENGLISH

Another busy term! Students need to have a well-earned break! With a bit of revision too!


