Greetings to you all. I find it quite astounding that this is our 4th newsletter and we are operating 4 classes for students here at school. Over a year ago we were a very small team of 4 staff and no students. I look back on our previous newsletters with astonishment at how much has been achieved and how well the students and staff have adapted and engaged so quickly with our ethos and approaches.

We continue to grow and improve in everything that we do and one area for improvement is attendance. It's not uncommon for schools like ours to have varying levels of attendance by the students but that

does not mean we won't strive for the best possible levels of engagement which is directly linked to future success and the best possible outcomes. Therefore we are appealing to students and parents/carers to attend school regularly and if we can offer further support with improving attendance then we urge parents to contact us so we can explore solutions together. I am pleased to report that the overall attendance for the school improved by over 10% in term 4, and many students continue to attend at over 90% of the time. Our aim is to support all students with regular attendance and to provide them with positive and exciting reasons to attend every day; such as this term offering cooking and baking lessons for the older students, offering swimming lessons for those that want to attend, and continuing to offer an exciting and well planned Forest School provision. For the oldest students we also have important qualifications to achieve and exams to prepare for, making regular attendance vital for them and their future choices of work or further education.

I hope you have had a restful Easter break and have managed to moderate your chocolate consumption. I look forward to welcoming everyone back to school on the 15th April.

Hi, I'm Georgina the Speech and Language Therapist at Newingate School.

I started in January, and I have been spending time in the classroom getting to know all the students. During March I have been doing baseline assessments on all pupils to identify communication strengths and difficulties and how we can best support students in the classroom. 

In Maths the class have completed some practice exam papers designed to show areas in which they need to increase their skills. This went well, and students have shown a good understanding of some topics.


Two of our students have completed modules towards their ASDAN course certificates and will be moving on to new topics next term.





Overall, Year 11 have worked very hard this term and we are proud of all that they have achieved.








SANDWICH CLASS

This term in Sandwich Class we have been very busy settling into some new routines and exploring different activities for P.E. and Outdoor learning. We have already started utilising the outdoor spaces now that the weather is better and have created some patterns with chalk in the playground area.

Our English focus this term has been based around poisonous poetry. We have explored a whole range of poetry written by a variety of poets, including Shakespeare. Throughout our English lessons, we have compared similarities and differences as well as analysing language that creates humour, setting, and atmosphere. As well as this we have had a focused session on Spelling and Grammer where we have considered the use of Capital letters and full stops and re-written sentences to ensure they are grammatically correct.

In Maths this term we have covered Properties of Numbers by learning square numbers, cube numbers and square and cube roots. This was before we moved onto calculating Indices and learning how to find the lowest common multiple of two numbers. We have also completed some net design in order to create some of our 3d shapes. Also, during this term there has been a whole school focus on times tables and the pupils engaged really well with our new Timetables Rockstars app, with some even downloading it to play outside of school.

This term in PSHE we have been looking into careers and Taking control of our future. We started with colouring an 'I can' picture to recognise our individual skills before identifying skills that are needed for the workplace. We then moved on to learning about enterprise and entrepreneurship before independently researching a modern-day entrepreneur.



In Science this term we focused on interdependence, Ecosystems, and plant reproduction. We were able to identify a food web before drawing our own. Next, we learned about how humans can impact the environment before creating our own PowerPoint based on our choice of endangered species. This has linked in with Geography where we have developed our knowledge of plastics and how single-use plastic can affect environments and animal habitats. The pupils engaged well with looking at plastic bans and laws as well as identifying the difference between single-use plastics and ones that can be recycled.







In ICT we have been developing our understanding of how computers communicate with each other. We identified what a network is and its components such as a server and a client. We created a historical timeline from 1946 to the modern day to see how technology has developed over time. We took part in a quiz and compared and identified the differences between software and hardware.

Students have enjoyed cooking for enrichment this term and have also explored other activities, such as making Mother's Day cards. As a class we took part in the whole school Times Tables Rockstars Battle. In the last week of term we took part in a whole school walk for the 'Walk for Autism' challenge.

We look forward to welcoming Sandwich class back after the Easter holidays and hope you all have a lovely break.

RYE CLASS

Term 4 has been full of excitement for Rye class. We now have a finished classroom that feels like home and the students have all contributed with ideas and suggestions about how it looks and feels.

Students have been learning all about 'Poisonous Poetry' in English. They have studied the works of William Blake and Shakespeare, as well as turning their hand to writing their very own humorous limericks.





Students have worked tirelessly to conquer square and cube roots, understand indices and challenge themselves with factorizing. All children have been signed up to TTrockstars and we have held our first school tournament!!



Students have worked hard to understand Bioaccumulation and how food webs and food chain are all connected, looking at ecosystems and the impact of pollution in Science. They have also been researching ways to help the environment when learning about the plastic problem in Global studies.

Rye class also really enjoyed world book day! We took inspiration from the famous Willy Wonka and students had fun creating their own Wonka Bars in class.

Best of all, students have been working really hard to understand each other and find news ways to communicate in class. They have bonded and started to develop positive relationships in the classroom and beyond.

DEAL



Attendance has been very good in Deal class this term and students have been engaging well in their lessons.

We celebrated World Book Day on the 7th March, it was excellent to see the students dress up as their favourite book characters. Students also decorated biscuits to create a book character or object from a book of their choice. We also created mono prints, illustrations and stamped labels to decorate our classroom door, all inspired by the book Alice in Wonderland.

In Maths, we spent the term exploring angles. The students can confidently recognise types of angles, measure angles using a protractor, measure angles in shapes and learnt how to construct and draw angles.

In Science, we have explored human reproduction and what is required to maintain a healthy body, we had some fantastic discussions as a class.

In English, we have explored how language has developed, how English fits into the world of languages and middle English. Students have also explored poetry, developing their analysis skills by looking at poems from different world cultures.

Students have spent time exploring Collagraph printing in art, responding to the work of printmaker Laurie Rudling. Students had a cardboard base and used textured materials to create a landscape scene, they used materials such as string, sand, cardboard and buttons. It was fantastic to see the students adapt to a new way of working so well.

I hope you all have a restful Easter and look forward to seeing the students return in Term 5.

Walk for Autism (2)





20,000 steps 20,000 steps

For the second year running, as a school we took up the challenge of walking 10,000 steps a day from Tuesday, March 26th to Tuesday, April 2nd, 2024. Our aim was to raise vital funds to support autistic children and adults in the UK and Ireland, while also promoting autism acceptance and understanding.



On Day 1 the entire school to a trip to Blean Woods to kickstart the Walk for Autism challenge. Together, we followed the red route and completed the 1.5 mile loop - collectively walking Over 92,000 steps!!

Students were kept engaged along the way with a Pokemon hunt and also enjoyed exploring the woodland and climbing the trees!









During the holidays, staff continued the challenge, getting their steps in where they could – even if that meant doing laps around the Leas Cliff Hall during a show interval, walking on a treadmill a home and even pacing around the bedroom before bed! Staff logged their steps every day and kept their fundraising pages updated.









Team Newingate put in a tremendous effort and by the end of Day 8 not only had staff individually reached their step targets, but as a team almost doubled the fundraising target and raised an incredible £993!!!
